It's in every state in the United States, including foreign countries, or church organizations right here in this town alone. I would be safe to say, a million dollar organization that's functioning with the Reverend Woods. You're not going to topple his. There's no way. He's not going to let you.

If it was just a matter of these men hoping and saying, "Well, we will tell you how the organization carried out the assassination of the President of the United States", you might be able to do it, but you're not going to be able to do it, because they're not going to let you topple the organization they have now.


